MBBS'26 WHITE COAT CEREMONY

The White Coat Ceremony is a rite of passage done in almost every medical school and this marks the transition from pre-clinical year to clinical years where students spend most of their time learning from the hospitals. During this ceremony, the students are given white coats and stethoscopes as a symbol of their new responsibilities as they become part of the healthcare team. It was a big day for the MBBS'2026 class and the joy, excitement, and pride felt on that day was immense.

The ceremony included multiple speeches that shared their warm congratulations to the class of MBBS'26 for achieving such a milestone and also shared important messages with the class. Dr. Natalie Mcall, Chair of the clinical medicine division, urged the students to always find joy in medicine throughout their medical practice, especially when they are on the verge of moral distress. The Interim vice-chancellor, Dr. Joel Mubiligi, also reminded students of what it means to be a medical professional. He emphasized the responsibility to treat every human life as sacred regardless of their background and see the profession from an equity lens. Dean Abebe also reminded the student that the patient should always come first in whatever they do. "If you remove a patient from the equation, you are just a dude in a white coat," he said.

After being handed their white coats and stethoscope to symbolize their transition the student recited the medical student Oath where the students, in front of their professors, peers, families, and friends, publicly accepted the responsibility that comes with the white coat and committed to a lifelong journey of learning how to cure, relieve, and comfort with humility and compassion. After that, Dr. Francoise Mukagaju, a general surgeon and Junior consultant at King Faisal Hospital shared professional career advice with the student who emphasized what had been mentioned earlier and reminded the students of the importance of sharing their achievements and failures with their loved ones throughout their whole journey and keeps their relationships thriving as well.

The ceremony was closed by remarks from student representative, Kevin Gakuba, who shared with the audience the euphoric feeling that the students were feeling at that point. His speech was full of gratitude, on behalf of his colleagues, to the BMS faculty, UGHE Staff, families, and friends for taking them smoothly through the BMS years, motivating them, and supporting them throughout the whole journey. To end his speech, he urged his colleagues to always remember UGHE's vision and Dr. Paul Farmer's legacy: to advance global Health Equity. NATIONAL WORLD ANATOMY DAY WITH UGHE CREATIVE & ART CLUB.

The recent anatomy artwork competitions were held in October 2022 on world anatomy day.

UGHE's Creative Art Club members attended the 1st World anatomy day in Rwanda, organized by the Society of Clinical Anatomy- Rwanda (SCAR) and MEDSAR. Dr. Julien Gashegu, Head Professor of Anatomy at the University of Rwanda, shared the history of anatomy in Rwanda, and how he introduced a cadaveric-based anatomical laboratory.

During the exhibition, several attending doctors, residents, and anatomists appreciated and commented on the promising potential of student's talents in achieving this ambitious goal.

Shyaka T. Modeste, the chair of Art Club shared us the visions.

Anatomy artwork competitions are competitions that were organized by the Society of Clinical Anatomists of Rwanda in partnership with MEDSAR with the aim of promoting students' knowledge of anatomy while developing their talents as well as contributing to anatomy education. Participating students are challenged to design artworks of their choice. The artwork should be addressing/explain any human anatomical structure, surgical procedure, and/or any other related to anatomy and its clinical practice.

UGHE students, among students from other universities, had an opportunity to participate. Moreover, their artworks were exhibited at the Society of clinical anatomists of Rwanda conference that was held on the same day.

It was first introduced on December 31st, but in January 2022, it was declared, and that made January the International One health month. However, one health day was introduced in 2016 by the one health commission.

University of Global Health Equity 'Student One Health Innovative Club' is a student-led club that is part of the broader African SOHICs. SOHIC is an African One Health University Network (AFROHUN) initiative composed of African universities aiming to advance one health in Africa. Currently, it is comprised of 9 countries and 18 universities. SOHICs were created with the aim of raising students' knowledge & awareness of health and health-related challenges in the community. Its Vision is to "Prepare future One Health champions in their education and workplace settings," with the mission to "develop and strengthen One Health skills and competencies of students by using a multidisciplinary approach with a primary focus on hands-on community activities".

One health month is a global campaign that celebrates and brings attention to the need for a One Health approach to address shared health threats at the human-animal-environment interface. One Health Day allows experts and the community to join in One Health education and awareness. Communication, coordination, and collaboration among partners working in animal, human, and environmental health and other relevant areas are essential to the One Health approach. Working together allows us to have the biggest impact on improving the health of people, animals, plants, and our shared environment. But one can celebrate One Health Day every day by working with experts in other sectors to achieve better health outcomes for all.

Grading the essays was over 40 marks and the average score for all the participants was 30.

HOLDING THE SCALPEL: A REFLECTION OF MY FIRST VISIT TO THE ANATOMY LAB



(Finding Fascia Through Human Dissection, 2022)

As I stood there astounded by the sight of what was once a young man full of life, the lab anatomist was holding that scalpel close to the skin trying to make a cut through or “an incision” as he called it. As my sight trailed across the covered face to the bony protrusions of elbows to the now incised abdomen, I felt my hands go numb. I sighed at the fact that the human body after death can only amount to this much and was mildly comforted by the idea that there is a story behind every human life. A story that will eventually outlive its owner. However, I was also amazed by the sheer complexity with which God created a human body. After seeing the intricate connections in the numerous tiny blood vessels, nerves, and muscles, I felt that it was one of the instances in which the words “Behind every atom of this world, hides an infinite universe.” by the 13th-century poet Rumi accurately presented the picture. Not to say that an atom can perfectly represent a human body but to show that behind the skin there is a whole ‘another world, you cannot expect by just watching outside.

Dissection can be a fascinating and educational experience, allowing individuals to learn about anatomy without the need for anatomy atlas or knowledge of every anatomical feature. Dissection reveals much about the human body and its connection to the environment, revealing new insights and revealing the human body’s internal connections. It is not uncommon for people to be blown away by the process of dissection.

MBBS 26 did their dissection after BMS, which was so exciting for everyone in the class for their young MBBS 28, had this exposure before the start of their anatomy modules, which was so helpful as the lectures were more of a review.

To many students, passion for surgery grows in this period. Exercising making incisions deep or superficial is a wooing feeling.

Despite the many peculiarities of the room such as several bodies placed around with each having a considerable amount of people surrounding with sharp-

metals as in some ritual or the slightly irritating smell that caused some to wear a second mask, I was instead immersed in the art of holding the scalpel itself, cutting and opening a hidden world to the outside and how everything connects to what we see outside.



In a nutshell, my visit to the anatomy lab was a fruitful one. I observed several anatomical structures that I had only heard about or seen in images (which were not at all as beautiful as presented in drawings). In addition, the visit added another layer of understanding I had about my future career as a doctor and how I should approach the patient considering the whole person rather than only the complaint. As Dr. Joshua Owolabi said, it was indeed a baptism to medical school.






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THE CULTURE DAY

ONE HEALTH GLOBAL CASE COMPETITION



An impressive and most exciting win was announced on 2nd May 2023, where the UGHE SOHIC team bet all other 7 teams from across the country at National Global Case Competition.

It didn't take long for the RDF officials and the other distinguished guests. And around 4:00 PM the match official put his whistle and deep from his soul he blew, and the game was underway.




